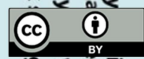


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Abstract: The abstract should summarize the research's purpose, main findings, and major conclusions. A single paragraph is about 150-200 words. For research articles, abstracts should give a pertinent overview of the work. We strongly encourage authors to use the following style of structured abstracts, but without headings: (1) Background: Place the question addressed in a broad context and highlight the purpose of the study; (2) Methods: briefly describe the main methods or treatments applied; (3) Results: summarize the article's main findings; (4) Conclusions: indicate the main conclusions or interpretations. As a result, references should be avoided.

Keywords: keyword 1; keyword 2; keyword 3 (List three to six pertinent keywords specific to the article yet reasonably common within the subject discipline.) Avoiding general and plural terms and multiple concepts (avoid, for example, 'and', 'of')

How to Use This Template

The template details the sections that can be used in a manuscript. Note that each section has a corresponding style. The section titles given are for articles. Review papers and letters article types have a more flexible structure. Remove this paragraph and start section numbering with 1. 1. Introduction



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The introduction should briefly situate the study in a broader context and emphasize why it is important. It should define the work's purpose and significance. The current state of the research field should be thoroughly examined, and key publications should be cited. Please highlight controversial and diverging hypotheses. Briefly state the main purpose of the work and highlight the main conclusions. Finally, references should be numbered in order of appearance and indicated by a numeral or numerals in square brackets—e.g., [1] or [2, 3], or [4–6].

2. Materials and Experiment Methods

The Materials and Experiment Methods should be described in detail so that others can replicate and build on the published results. New methods and protocols should be thoroughly described, whereas well-established methods should be briefly described and appropriately cited. Please keep in mind that publishing your manuscript entails making all data, materials, and computer code, associated with the publication available to readers. Please disclose any restrictions on the availability of materials or information at the time of submission.

3. Results and Discussion

Subheadings may be used to divide this section. It should provide a concise and precise description of the experimental results, their interpretation, and possible experimental conclusions. The authors should discuss the findings and how they can be interpreted considering previous research and the working hypotheses. The findings and implications should be discussed in the broadest possible context. Future research directions may be highlighted as well.

4. Conclusions

Conclusions should answer the objectives of research. Tells how your work advances the field from the present state of knowledge. Without clear Conclusions, reviewers and readers will find it difficult to judge the work. The main conclusions of the study may be presented in a short Conclusions section, which may stand alone or form a subsection of a Discussion or Results and Discussion section.

The following statements should be used “Conceptualization, A.A.; methodology, A.A.; software, B.B.; validation, A.A., B.B. and C.C.; formal analysis, C.C.; investigation, D.D.; resources, C.C.; data curation, A.A.; writing—original draft preparation, B.B.; writing—review and editing, A.A.; visualization, B.B.; supervision, C.C.; project administration, X.X.; funding acquisition, Y.Y. All authors have read and agreed to the published version of the manuscript.” Authorship must be limited to those who have contributed substantially to the work reported.

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Appendix A

The appendix is an optional section that can contain details and data that are not included in the main text, such as explanations of experimental details that would disrupt the flow of the main text but are still necessary for understanding and reproducing the research shown; figures of replicates for experiments with representative data shown in the main text can be added here if brief, or as Supplementary data. Appendices can contain mathematical proofs of results that are not central to the paper.

References must be numbered in the order in which they appear in the text (including citations in tables and legends) and listed at the end of the manuscript. To avoid typing errors and duplicated references, please use Reference Manager Applications like EndNote, Mendeley, Zotero, etc. Where available, include the digital object identifier (DOI) for all references. In the text, reference numbers should be placed in square brackets [] and placed before the punctuation; for example [1], [1–3] or [1,3].
